



**Ball State at the Games  
Rio de Janeiro 2016  
Media Coverage Report and Analysis**

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### ***Background to Ball State at the Games Rio 2016***

Ball State University sent more than 50 students to Rio de Janeiro from July 15 to August 18, 2016 to provide behind-the-scenes coverage of the 2016 Olympics. Ball State at the Games is a student-managed news operation that works in conjunction with several media organizations to provide original multimedia content about the Olympic culture, host country, athletes and spectators. Created by Ball State's Department of Journalism to report from the 2012 Olympic Games in London, the program then continued with Sochi in 2014. This time, more than 50 students traveled to South America before and during the Olympics. Stationed in the United States, eight public relations students also comprised the home team, and they handled media relations, edited content and maintained the website, [bsuatthegames.com](http://bsuatthegames.com). Another eight worked in Chicago, creating information graphics for the Chicago Tribune.

"BSU at the Games provides our students with an intercultural learning experience while also providing professional skills and development they would not receive in the classroom," said Ryan Sparrow, director of Ball State at the Games and a journalism instructor. "It's a once in a lifetime opportunity to be part of and share in the tradition of such a global event."

As part of the the immersive learning opportunity, students who traveled to Brazil had the opportunity to take courses focused on multimedia reporting on volleyball, documentary filmmaking, broadcast video creation, public relations, visual communication and Brazilian culture.

Additional program instructors included Colleen Steffen, journalism instructor and features team adviser; Adam Kuban, assistant professor and sports team adviser; Deborah Davis, assistant professor and public relations team adviser; Suzy Smith, associate professor and video team adviser; Jeff Holiday, telecommunications instructor; and Terry Heifetz, instructor of telecommunications instructor.

Ball State at the Games interacted on social media through Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and Snapchat ([bsuatthegames](http://bsuatthegames.com)). The project's website, [bsuatthegames.com](http://bsuatthegames.com), has original stories, blogs and photos.

### ***Ball State at the Games 2016 Media Analysis Report***


Ball State at the Games 2016 received a total of 33 media placements between the months leading up to the Olympics, the duration of the Olympics and the months following the Olympics.

*This chart shows how many stories were placed during these days during the program.*

This chart shows the frequency of posts per days from the time of the first media placement to the last media placement. One can tell from the chart that the highest traffic of media placements took place during the height of the Olympic Games, from Aug. 8 to Aug. 19. There are variety of reasons that contributed to the highest frequency of media placements during this time, such as the Olympics were the most relevant during the middle of the Olympics, and it was the height of the Olympic excitement. There were also the most frequent amount of stories being produced by the writers of Ball State at the Games at this time. 70 Percent of stories were

in Indiana media, 30% of stories were in media that were outside of Indiana, including national media.

The total 33 stories were shared among 21 media sources. The graph above shows the amount of stories each media that was involved picked up.

The media source that most frequently picked up stories was The Herald Bulletin, a source that showcased both stories about the students who traveled to Rio as well as distributed stories written by the students. The Herald Bulletin primarily serves Madison County, a county that neighbors Delaware County, where Ball State is located. With students most likely coming to Ball State and from Madison County, as well as Ball State being so close, it seems natural to see that the majority of stories came from this news source.

The graph shows both surprising and exciting data in the right hand of the graph. Media sources that only picked up one story from or about Ball State at the Games can be intriguing. For example, it may be interesting to some to see that the IndyStar, a major Indianapolis news source, only picked up one story. Indianapolis is a major city near Ball State and a large news source in Indiana, and only one thing was shared about BSUATG from them. Exciting placement that falls within the media sources that only picked up one media placement are TIME, USA Today and USA Today College, three national news sources also picked up one story each. Time ran one story, Hendrix Magley’s story “Lilly King’s Dad Can’t Believe His Messy Daughter Became an Olympic Star” which was a feature of an Indiana University swimmer Lilly King and her family. USA Today ran two stories, one on USA Today’s website,

“Student journalists hunt for Olympics stories in Rio” and another on USA Today College’s website, “College student volunteers help build first playground in impoverished Rio favela”. Both of the stories featured on USA Today were feature stories about what some of the Ball State at the Games students did while in Rio. Ball State received national attention through these three stories that featured the program itself and displayed a student’s work on a national level as well.

WTHR is a news station based in Indianapolis that placed media from Ball State at the Games both on their website and on television. The two stories that appeared on WTHR’s website were both written by Ball State at the Games students. Jake Fox wrote “Lifelong friends continue Olympics adventures in Rio” and Kaitlin Lange wrote “IU Swimming Stands out in Rio Olympics”. The video content that came from WTHR featured students who attended the trip as well as the video work that students created.

The Ball State Daily News, Ball State’s student run newspaper, placed two stories about and from Ball State at the Games, which showcased the project to the Ball State student population that the paper is catered towards. Hendrix Magley’s story “Ball State alumnus coaches 2 Olympic beach volleyball teams” was a feature story of an alumni of Ball State who coaches Olympic beach volleyball teams, and Madeline Grosh and her experience in Rio through the program was also featured in the Ball State Daily News under a story titled “Students share stories of summer travel”.

Ball State at the Games Rio 2016 immersive learning program met a minimum of three of the 18 by ‘18 Centennial Commitment initiatives the university currently had and it striving to meet. The Ball State at the Games program fulfills three initiatives, “Provide Extraordinary Student Life Experiences”, “Provide Innovative and Entrepreneurial Education” and “Enhance Post Graduation Career Preparation”.

### **What’s Next?**

These media relationships should be maintained until and after the next Ball State at the Games. Media contacts such as Time, Ball State University, IndyStar, Ball State Daily News and Indiana Public Radio are either local to Ball State University or are at a national level, and will therefore be relevant when it comes to media relationships for future Ball State at the Games and future Ball State University projects that can be pitched to media.

Other media relationships formed during this game may be more difficult to maintain in the future, and may be less important to maintain than the previously stated contacts. Many of the media contacts are local to students who participated in Ball State at the Games, and in future Ball State at the Games, there may not be students from that local area which means that the media contacts may not have an interest in covering students who are not from their area and are therefore may be irrelevant to them. Media relationships should still be maintained with these contacts to a degree though, especially if the contact picked up stories from our students

and will want content from a future Ball State at the Games, no matter what student writes it. Also, in the event that students involved in BSUATG do come from hometowns that are local to those smaller media contacts, then it will hopefully be easier to get more media about Ball State at the Games with those contacts.
